Dear Mr. Kubota:

You will never know how delighted I was to receive your letter of March 4th which reached me last Friday. That was amazingly rapid service, wasn't it? But I have not received previous letters from you for almost a year now and I have been wondering what in the world had happened. I knew I could trust you always, and I knew that the Brothers had need of your service as liaison men between them and me and your countrymen. Yet my last two letters had not been answered! Now I know they had been, but I had not received the answers.

Enclosed is the latest and most important news of events. Mr. Straith, the writer, I have been told is doing highly secret work and is not easily found. His Committee, on the other hand, is being much discussed both on radio and TV in this nation, and must surely be well known through other nations. Official investigations naturally are being conducted, and efforts are being made to claim this letter's box, but this is impossible. The stationery is authentic, and it is not allowed to be used promiscuously by anyone. It is official.

Enclosed also is a list of my Japanese correspondents with whom you may share this information, along with anyone else who you may be able to interest.

The most important thing I would like to ask of you at the moment is for you to contact Mr. Beck in an effort to get from him the translation of the symbols which he has sent to me. The scroll he has sent is beautiful and I have done my best to get it translated here. But, I have been told, it is written in a combination of Japanese, Korean, and Chinese characters, which even scholars have been unable to translate. In the end they decide Mr. Beck is only asking for money with which to produce a movie and really has nothing of value. I do not agree with this interpretation for I believe he has something of historical, philosophical and prophetic in nature. I feel that you will be able to get the truth for me from Mr. Beck who seems unable to write the translation in English, although does carry on an excellent correspondence in English.

Later this week I shall send you the latest information as to how the program is working throughout the world, a list of the names and addresses of those leaders who are cooperating in this program, letters received from Japan with my replies, which is for your further understanding of the whole event and which you forward to the writers after reading my replies, and other information that has accumulated during the past six months. Since airmail is so expensive, I shall send this surface mail. It will take longer, but there is an abundance of material to send and will probably take you quite some time to get through it.

Since there seems to be an interruption in our mail somewhere, I shall register my mail to you, and suggest that you do likewise in writing to me. This apparently is the only safe method for sure delivery.
